


Dyslexia Awareness Coffee Morning Friday 4th November

This includes repairing hives and researching flowers to plant that will provide the most amount of nectar for our local climate. This session we were visited by the Head of Learning for the Scottish Government, Graeme Logan, along with colleagues from the Scottish Attainment Challenge who were hugely impressed with our project and the use of PEF money within our school. Local MSP Monica Lennon also visited out bees and we were mentioned in Holyrood as Mrs Lennon raised a parliamentary motion which recognises the hard work of our beekeepers. 1615 Club Update



Eva was born in Mauthausen concentration camp, Austria, on 29th April 1945. She and her mother are the only survivors of their family, 15 members of whom were killed in Auschwitz-Birkenau: three of Eva's grandparents, her father, uncles, aunts and her 7-year-old cousin, Peter. You can read more about Eva's incredible story of survival here.

https://www.het.org.uk/survivors-evaclarke S6 students Niamh Jamieson and Ellie Talent joined senior students from across Scotland to take part in a visit to the Nazi concentration and death camp Auschwitz-Birkenau in Poland. The visit in November was part of the Holocaust Education Trust's Lessons from Auschwitz project. Each year students from schools across the UK participate in the 'Lessons from Auschwitz' project. Based on the premise that 'hearing is not like seeing', students visit Auschwitz-Birkenau as part of a four-part course that explores the universal lessons of the Holocaust and its relevance today. The Project aims to increase knowledge and understanding of the Holocaust for young people and to highlight what happens when prejudice and racism are unchallenged.

The project is run by the Holocaust Educational Trust. Founded in 1988, HET aims to educate young people about the Holocaust and the important lessons learned from it. Since 1999, more than 37,000 students and teachers have taken part in the Lessons from Auschwitz Project. Their visit was the first HET has organised since 2019, when the pandemic forced them to switch to an online platform. As well as visiting Auschwitz-Birkenau, Niamh and Ellie participated in two online seminars. In one of these, they heard the testimony from holocaust survivor Eva Clarke and took part in a question and answer session with her afterwards.

Niamh described her experience of the project as 'a life changing experience', and one that 'everyone should have the chance to do.'

Niamh and Ellie are now official ambassadors for the Holocaust Education Trust; they will lead a project in St John Ogilvie High School where they will share their experiences and pass on what they have learned to others.

Support for Learning Dept. - Family Learning Events



On Tuesday 8th November, the Support for Learning department welcomed several families of S1 pupils along to our first family learning event of the year. This event focussed on ways in which learners with dyslexia, or who are experiencing literacy difficulties, can be supported in school and at home. During the session, parents and carers were given the opportunity to try out activities which provided some insight into the barriers to learning experienced by learners with dyslexia and literacy difficulties. The families found it eye-opening to learn about the many obstacles which pupils may need to overcome and the impact that literacy difficulties may have on other areas of the curriculum. We then looked at ways in which we can support pupils to overcome these barriers e.g. with the use of coloured overlays, creating mind maps to organise notes, highlighting key ideas in a text and using text-to-speech and speech-to-text assistive software. Feedback was very positive with families commenting how worthwhile and enlightening the session was.



We then held another family learning event on Wednesday 30th November, this time focussing on the Fresh Start Reading and Spelling programme used in some S1 English classes. This event gave parents and carers an overview of the programme and gave the opportunity for them to experience some of the activities and tasks which their children participate in during Fresh Start sessions. We also distributed anthology texts which go hand-in-hand with the modules taught in class and can be used at home to reinforce the speed sounds which are being covered in school. Again, feedback on the event was positive with parents/carers finding it very useful to gain more insight into how they can support the development of reading and spelling skills within the home.

Our next family learning event will be held on Monday 23rd January and will focus on numeracy. Letters will be sent out in the New Year and we look forward to seeing some of you then.

In November, the STJOHS English department invited our national 5 students and their families We were thrilled to be able to take our pupils back to the theatre this term.


This is always an extremely valuable experience for our young people, deepening their understanding of the texts that they are studying and giving them a taste of the excitement and drama of a live theatrical production.



The first employee of the month was Daniel Bocheneck.


